1. Open up "Settings"
2. Under "General Account Settings", on the line that says "Name", click "Edit".
3. Enter your callsign in the space marked "Alternate name".
4. Check the box for "Include this on my timeline".
5. Save these settings by entering your Facebook password in the box marked "Password".
6. Click on the box marked "Save Changes".

Now return to your Main page and your callsign will appear under your name.

K3STL: Besides ham radio, what other hobbies do you have?

KU2US: My other hobbies include Power boating, stamp collecting, rifle and pistol shooting.

K3STL: Was the 13 colonies special event your idea? If so, when/how did it start to form?

KU2US: The 13 Colonies special event was my idea. It started to form in 2008, when I just finished the ARRL sweepstakes. I thought that we did not have many events like this. Our first year was 2009 with over 12,000 contacts. I felt that we need something patriotic to celebrate, it was lacking on the bands. Thus the 13 Colonies was born.

K3STL: What's it like to run such a popular event?

KU2US: To run this event and other like it, patience and fortitude are required. Intricate planning of every detail is a must. Organizational skills are put to the test. A love of, and a firm belief in the theme of the event. Most of all, a strong desire to have FUN, and to make it FUN for others.

K3STL: What's your favorite memory from the 13 colonies special event?

KU2US: My favorite memory taken from this event is twofold. It is bittersweet. Paul Copeland was one of my state operators. He worked his station during the event right up to the week he passed away. Our 13 Colonies Special event Group operator awards are named in his honor. The second part was when a QRZ.com poll named our event as the top event, in which all others should emulate. This was quite an honor

K3STL: What are some of the biggest challenges you face while running the 13 colonies special event?

KU2US: Some of the biggest challenges to date are keeping all of the state groups coordinated, informed and in some instances staffed. Getting out the requested certificates and QSL cards at the end of the event without mistakes is a huge challenge, and estimating supplies and expenses for the next year.

K3STL: What issues did you have in the early times of the event?

KU2US: In the early times of the event, the only challenge was staffing the states. Many did not know who we were back then.

K3STL: Are you surprised that this event has grown to what it is today?

KU2US: I am not surprised that our event has grown so much, I am OVERWHELMED! The reception from the Ham Radio community is wonderful. It means we are doing something right, providing a fun time for all, and at the same time honoring the birth of our country and its military, active and veterans.

How K3STL got his callsign

I started out as KB3LVH (That's Kilo Bravo Three Lookin Very Handsome) and was having problems being understood in contests or working DX. I wanted a 1X2 call, but couldn't find a call I liked. As many of you know I'm a Steelers fan, and, while looking at the available callsigns, K3STL was available. It's the closest thing to an abbreviated "Steelers" I could find and K3STL became my callsign.

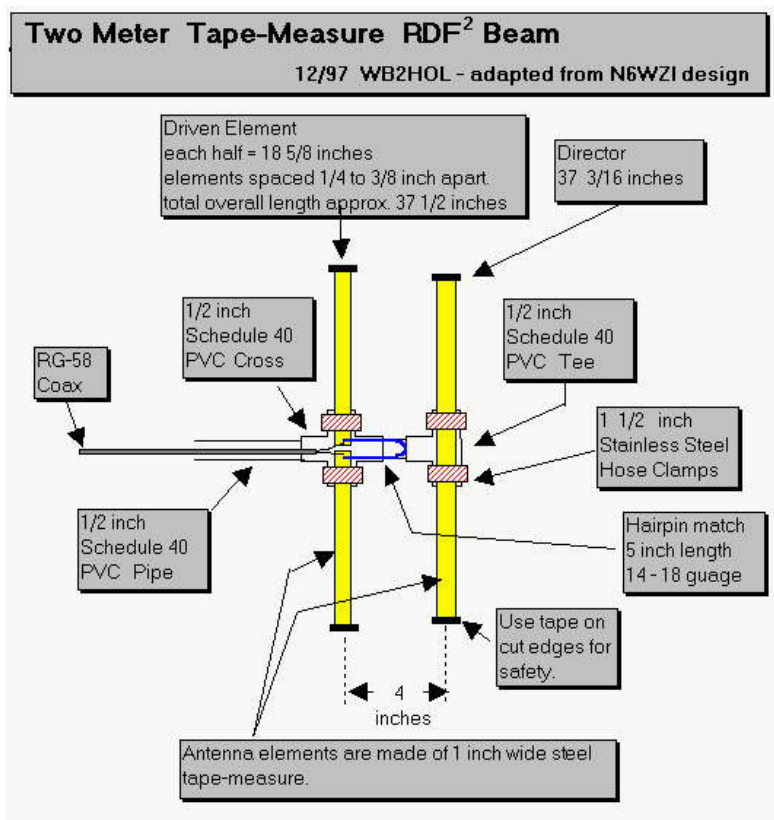
The following article about Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) is Part 3 of a 5 part series by Bob Bereit – K3RMB

A Tape Measure 2m Yagi Antenna For ARDF

Search the internet and you will find a multitude of antenna designs, for use in fox hunting (Amateur Radio Direction Finding). There are loops, 2, 3, and 4 element hand-held Yagi designs, all of which can be used for this purpose. Arrow Antennas (Cheyenne, WY) sells several models specifically for this purpose.

The fox hunting antenna used at the National Scout Jamboree is a simple 2-element Yagi. This antenna is easily constructed out of PVC Pipe, a tape measure, a few hose clamps, a bit of coax and SMA connector. Most of the pieces can be purchased at your neighborhood big-box home store. This antenna is an adaptation of the RDF² two element, close spaced Yagi antenna described in the May, 1996 issue of *73 Amateur Radio Today*. This particular variant was developed by Joe Leggio (WB2HOL) and full details on the construction and performance of the antenna can be found at http://theleggios.net/wb2hol/projects/rdf/snif_bm.htm.

Almost everything you need to know for building this antenna can be found in this diagram from WB2HOL's web site:





Leggio's write-up talks about using 'replacement' tape measure blades, but I couldn't find that specific component. No big deal, however, as a new 1" wide X 25' tape measure can easily be obtained for less than \$10. In my case, the most expensive component of the project turned out to be the SMA connector, since I chose to buy one with a pigtail coax attached.



Using this antenna, with over 1,000' between the receiver and transmitter, signal strength was full scale no matter the direction the antenna was pointed. That makes it very difficult to home in on the 'fox' in wooded or hilly terrain. Consequently some method of signal attenuation is required, to reduce the received signal level to the point that the S-meter of the receiver can be used to help determine the direction toward the transmitter. We will deal with the issue of attenuation in the next article in this series.
